This RFP is for federal work. CSPI will have an RFP for state and local school foods work this Spring.





Federal Lobbying Grants: Healthy School Meals

We are accepting applications for funding for up to **\$25,000 in direct costs for up to 12 months** to advocate for key school food priorities at the federal level via:

- Child Nutrition Reauthorization (as relevant), and similar legislation as needed, such as the Build Back Better Act (BBBA)
- Annual appropriations that support school meal priorities
- Regulatory advocacy with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for school meals

Priorities include:

- Protecting and strengthening the school food nutrition standards.
- Providing healthy school meals for all (offering free meals to all students)
- Other priorities based on applicant's areas of interest

Priority states: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Vermont





Additional areas of advocacy (encouraged, not required)

- Increased reimbursement and technical assistance on nutrition standards
- Seat time/mealtime requirements
- Eliminate synthetic food dyes and artificial sweeteners
- Funding for kitchen equipment
- Summer meals nutrition standards

Applications are welcome to include additional priorities not listed.



Lobbying activities

- Lobbying Representatives and/or Senators
- Power mapping to determine grasstops allies (e.g., state or local officials, senior leaders in influential organizations, etc.) to weigh in with the Congressional member
- Generating support through calls to action with social media, blogs, and action alerts
- Recruiting grasstops to join lobbying meetings and have grasstops conduct separate lobbying meetings;
- Building grassroots for specific calls to action of the Congressional member (e.g., letter-writing campaigns, action alerts, participating in virtual events with the Congressional member, etc.)

Applications are welcome to include additional lobbying activities not listed



Non-lobbying activities

- Developing and disseminating public comments and other materials in response to USDA rulemaking on school food nutrition standards
- Engaging with state and local media (e.g., interviews, opeds, letter to the editor, editorial memo, etc.)
- Training advocates and/or building local advocacy capacity
- Story banking/collection of stories or any other creative materials developed on the importance of the issue
- Public or coalition meetings to educate and build support among other allies and neutralize opposition on the issue

Applications are welcome to include additional non-lobbying activities not listed.



What's requested in a Lobbying Grant Application?

Organization information

- Contact information
- EIN/Tax ID of org or fiscal sponsor
- Demographic information
- Overview of organization's work in relation to the grant opportunity
- Project Leadership
- Organization budget information
- Conflict of interest check

Funding request

- Requested funding amount
- Detailed budget upload

Project details

- Project title
- Estimated duration
- Project summary and rationale
- Project activities and timeline
- Project partners
- Potential obstacles
- Past and present strategies to advance equity
